Led 2 public presentations on Low-Impact Climbing and Preventative Search and Rescue

Responded to **46** incidents, of which **19** required first-aid care

maintained for biodiversity, agriculture, viewsheds, and cultural history

30 miles of carriage roads

maintained and 11 carriage roads repaired due to major storm damage.

20 miles reblazed and 30 cedar signs crafted to replace damaged carriage road and trail signs

New data collection system

developed through ArcGIS Field Maps to evaluate trails network

Pin Oak Allee Trees Pruned for long-term health

77 original tree species planted in the early 1900's were trimmed and stablized to stimulate future growth.

Facilities Improvements

- 3 EV charging stations installed with the capacity for 5 vehicles
- 3 education sites refurbished
- 5 picnic tables built and installed
- 6 benches crafted from a downed native red oak and installed


